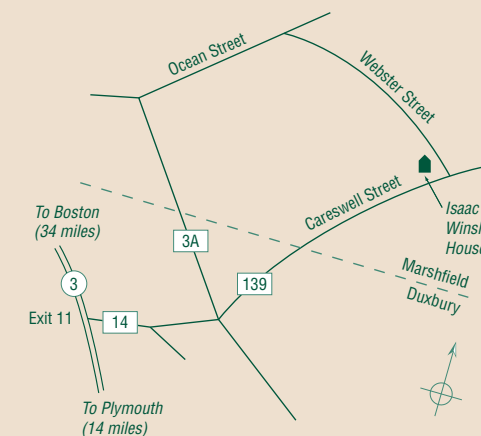
RENTALS •

DIRECTIONS •

Proceed south from Boston, or north from Plymouth on Route 3. Take Exit 11 and bear right onto Route 14. After the Duxbury police station, bear left at the fork onto Route 139. Continue through the intersection of Route 3A. The Winslow House is 1.4 miles ahead on the left at the intersection of Webster and Careswell Streets. Ample parking is available.

Ghosts from King Philip's War •

Ghosts from King Philip's War is a well-researched collection of short stories about ghostly visions throughout New England, based on the horrific King Philip's War fought from 1675–1679. The two-year conflict took a deplorable toll on both sides. Brutality between settler and native Indian placed it as one of the worst wars fought on American soil. Many of the Indians, who once befriended the English settlers in Plymouth, were completely obliterated in the war while others were captured and sold into slavery or died from starvation and exposure.

“SEARCHING FOR THE BOSTON STRANGLER” •

Casey Sherman

Casey Sherman is the author Search for the Strangler, a book which chronicles his own 14-year investigation into the notorious ‘Boston Strangler’ case. Sherman's aunt, Mary Sullivan, was the final victim found (over)

dead in 1964. At 19 years of age, she was also the youngest victim of the two-year crime spree. Sherman has looked at the forensic evidence against confessed killer Albert DeSalvo, and his findings may surprise you.

“LONGFELLOW AT 200” •

Prof. Charles Calhoun, a member of the Maine Humanities Council, has written the first modern biography of the man who created and defined Victorian American culture, entitled Longfellow: A Rediscovered Life. Longfellow remains the most popular poet of American times, and it is his epic poems such as *Evangeline*, *The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere*, *The Courtship of Myles Standish*, and *The Song of Hiawatha* that have helped to shape our country's culture and historical record for all time.

“MODERN DECENDANTS OF THE ACADIANS” •

Professor John Chetro-Szivos is head of the communications department at Fitchburg State College.
